Thought Leadership

Highlights

- The events we ran with the UK Government's Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) ensured an additional £84 million funding was secured for Scotland. Our members are at the forefront of organisations tackling economic challenges of AI & data, an aging society, future of mobility and clean growth
- Our Rural Commission Report proposes measures which ensure the full economic potential of every part of Scotland is realised
- Our joint advocacy with Universities Scotland led to the reinstatement of the post-study work visa enabling international students to stay in the UK for two years after graduation
- Data Lab were tasked by the Scottish Government to lead the development of a World-Leading Al
 and Data Strategy for an Inclusive Scotland a key ask of our report
- £2m funding announced by the Scottish Government to test mobility as a service (MaaS), called for in our Connectivity Commission report
- Members were kept informed of Brexit developments with briefings and workshops across Scotland
- Our Productivity Clubs are providing much needed support to businesses and proving popular with members attracting more than 500 members in the first month
- Technological resilience was added to the Scottish National Investment Bank missions, which we had pressed for to support data and digital innovation
- Our call to remove the 'third party right of appeal' from the Planning Bill was successful
- We supported giving local authorities the power to implement a Working Place Parking Levy.

Building a World-Leading AI and Data Strategy for an Inclusive Scotland

Scotland has the potential to become a world-leader in the fields of data science and artificial intelligence but data scandals and business models which exploit behavioural data have dented public trust in recent years. SCDI partnered with BT Scotland, Scotland IS, and the RSE to champion the opportunities and harness the potential Artificial Intelligence (AI) technologies and data provide to improve the wellbeing of Scotland's people.

Our March report called for a joint strategy to drive the use of artificial intelligence which could generate £13 billion in additional economic output. The announcement that Data Lab, Scotland's Innovation Centre for data and AI, had been tasked by the Scottish Government to lead the development of the strategy yet again demonstrated SCDI's influence and reach thanks to our members' collective expertise. SCDI continues to shape this important work as a member of the steering committee chaired by Digital Economy Minister Kate Forbes which will culminate in a Strategy Launch in September 2020.

Maximising Rural Scotland's Economic Contribution

For Scotland's economy to flourish we need to harness the potential of people, businesses, and communities, in all geographies. Rural Scotland accounts over a quarter of Scotland's economy but is home to only one in five of our population. Our Rural Commission highlighted the interconnected nature of housing, transport and employment barriers and the need to tackle these collectively to unlock economic potential. With a focus on people, place and driving business growth it highlights the collective impact of actions that link together to make a difference. The report contains 42 recommendations, which, if enacted, will help ensure a greater contribution from rural Scotland to sustainable economic growth.







The Rural Commission Report: An Economy for All of Scotland

The need to act to transform our economy to deliver netzero saw SCDI launch our **Clean Growth Leadership Group** in September at an event which attracted high profile speakers and helped our members understand the scale and pace of the challenge and the need for a paradigm shift. The Leadership Group is now developing a route-map to 2045 and a net-zero Scotland.

Our Investment and UK Industrial Strategy Commission set up in March 2018 was instrumental in helping us raise awareness of the opportunities and secured additional investment in the Scottish economy.

In setting up our **Skills and Employability Leadership Group** we sought to develop a clear approach to delivering the right skills to meet our future needs in response to the opportunities and challenges of the Forth Industrial Revolution. This vital work builds on our work on digital over recent years.

Our Big Data & Health Economy Research Project launched in Summer 2019 and is exploring how insights and innovations from ethical and secure data can be harnessed to transform health and social care to save lives, reduce costs, attract investment and create jobs.

Brexit continues to create uncertainty for our members. We have ensured your voice has been heard at the highest levels and kept you briefed on the steps you should take to build resilience and position your organisation for what lies ahead.

Through **Productivity Club Scotland** we are looking at all of the issues and the individual measures businesses can take to improve their performance, facilitating impactful and practical peer-to-peer learning.



Year Ahead

As I start my first full year with SCDI it feels like the need for an organisation, which believes that every part of the Scottish economy - private, public and not for profit - has ideas, abilities and responsibilities for creating a successful future, has never been greater.

I'm hugely encouraged – although not surprised - by our members level of ambition in taking action on the challenges which will shape our fortunes as a country and their eagerness to engage positively to deliver an economy which supports all of Scotland to flourish.

2019 was the year many of us began to realise the pace and scale of economic and societal transformation required to tackle climate change and SCDI starts the year with a strong Leadership Group ready to work with our members to identify opportunities to meet Scotland's essential emissions reduction targets. They will inform SCDI's input into Scotland's Climate Change Plan, but also seek to catalyse actions across our membership and beyond to deliver clean growth and jobs.

Building on our skills work this year we'll be running events across Scotland to focus on how its recommendations can be tailored and implemented in regional economies to support business growth and our future workforce.

High-perfoming workplaces are one of the critical ingredients for fixing our productivity problem – and the latest figures suggest that there remains much to do. The popularity of our Productivity Clubs pilot with the Scottish Government demonstrates a real appetite on the part of Scotland's business community to make improvements and share learnings, and we're keen to build on the positive feedback from this initiative.

This is even more important given the uncertain outlook. Following the UK's exit from the European Union at the end of January, negotiations this year on a trade deal will be of great significance, with the fallout from the trade war between US and China already making itself felt among our exporters. SCDI will reconvene our International Group, to be chaired by Martin Bell of the Scotch Whisky Association and build our capacity to support members. As ever we will continue to work with both governments and are exploring opportunities for more activity in London. Our May Forum promises to be the best yet and is your opportunity to engage collaboratively and in depth with the issues and ideas for Scotland's economy. As a member of SCDI it was always a go-to event for me to inform forward plans, strengthen and make new contacts and partnerships, and meet senior decision-makers in Scotland, the UK and beyond.

This will also be a chance for us to discuss how we can take forward and deliver the vision in SCDI's new Blueprint which sets a bold vision for Scotland and makes practical recommendations to unlock Scotland's many opportunities. It'll be rooted in those shared values in which SCDI believes and with your backing it can spark a successful and sustainable future for Scotland.

I'd like to thank members and staff alike for the warmth of your welcome to what feels more like a movement than an organisation. I look forward to working with you in the months and years ahead.
