We do this because SCDI has always been foremost an agency which challenges the economy to deliver its best for all of Scotland. We achieve this by thinking deeply with you, our membership, and applying rigour and objectivity that comes from SCDI's broad membership. But we are not a blue skies think tank.

To achieve this collective ambition, we have made changes which ensure our focus and competence is directed to matters which are relevant to members, our economy and society.

We have a re-vitalised team with new competencies. I am pleased that I joined an organisation with such ambition and support from membership and stakeholders. I look forward to working with, and for, you in the future as we ensure that SCDI continues to be relevant, engaged and focused on identifying opportunities and solutions to Scotland's economic circumstances.

Vision & Mission

Vision

Our businesses, public services and people are thriving through sustainable growth in an economy which enables all of Scotland's communities to flourish.

Mission

To catalyse action by all of those in civic society who can contribute to sustainable growth in an economy which ensures that businesses, public services, people and communities are thriving.

Policy

SCDI's policy priority was to continue to influence and inspire actions by government and our members based on the recommendations in *From Fragile to Agile*, our Blueprint for growth and prosperity in the Scottish economy, but in the new context of the UK's vote to leave the EU.

Our Forum, 'Brave New Worlds? – Economic Growth & Wealth Creation'¹, once again brought together policy-makers and leaders from our diverse membership to progress our shared agenda.

Following the referendum, SCDI, along with SCDI members and other partners, worked with both the Scottish and UK governments as they developed new strategies and support for the economy.

SCDI was very active in influencing the development of the UK's new Industrial Strategy, especially in how it could offer greater benefit to the Scottish economy, meeting Ministers and senior officials in support of a submission to the UK Government produced with members². In the subsequent White Paper, SCDI welcomed the substantial investment which is being made available for innovation challenges, and the increased recognition that the strategy should support all regions, including rural areas, and smaller growth sectors, should develop productivity, innovation and lifelong learning in workplaces, and should give a higher priority to clean growth.

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As a member of the Scottish Government's Ministerial Review Group for the review of enterprise and skills agencies, SCDI supported changes to join-up support for innovation, investment and internationalisation. SCDI took a particularly close interest in the development of a South of Scotland Agency, in engagement with the private sector in the city region growth deal processes and the new regional partnerships, and in protecting the autonomy and strengths of Scotland's higher education and regional bodies, and welcomed the outcomes in these key respects.

Building on our input to the industrial strategy and enterprise and skills support, in 2018 SCDI will be launching a commission on the rural economy which will identify the opportunities and practical actions

to ensure a vibrant, growing and sustainable inclusive rural economy for all.

SCDI's Blueprint called for a fundamental review of business rates in Scotland. SCDI submitted evidence to the Barclay Review of business rates, including more regular revaluations for rates flex with market conditions; use of CPI rather than RPI; and support for productive investments and competitiveness with the rest of the UK. It was very welcome that the Barclay Review also made recommendations on these points and that the Scottish Government has responded positively. This year, SCDI intends to establish a leadership group on the long-term future of tax in Scotland.

Turning to infrastructure, SCDI represented Scottish interests in the development of a major report on a *Vision for UK Infrastructure*³, delivered to the new UK National Infrastructure Commission. SCDI made substantial submissions to the Scottish Government on Scotland's

Energy Strategy⁴ and reform of the planning system⁵, and has been chairing Transport Scotland working groups on the refresh of Scotland's National Transport Strategy and on high speed rail to Scotland.

SCDI partnered with ScotlandIS, BT Scotland and the Royal Society of Edinburgh on the research report Smart Citizens, Smart City Regions; Delivering Digital Public Services in Scotland⁶ which informed and influenced the refresh of the Scottish Government's digital strategy. In early 2018 the partners will publish their

next report, on the Fourth Industrial Revolution and the Scottish economy.

Skills remained a top priority for SCDI and our members. SCDI was a member of the independent STEMEC group, chaired by SCDI Board Member and Deputy Chair Ian Wall, which produced a report⁷ advising the Scottish Government on the development of its draft STEM Education and Training strategy. SCDI also worked with members to submit recommendations⁸ to strengthen the final strategy.

SCDI continued to engage with senior Ministers from both governments and all parties, as well as provide policy submissions to government and parliamentary committees.

SCDI supported the work of a range of parliamentary committees, giving oral evidence to the Economy, Jobs and Fair Work. Education and Skills. Finance and Culture, Tourism, Europe and External Relations committees in Holyrood and the Scottish Affairs Committee in Westminster on behalf of members for a range of inquiries. SCDI also continued to meet with Government Ministers. parliamentarians and senior officials, to organise opportunities for our members to do so, to represent SCDI members in a wide range of meetings, working groups and committees, and to make other submissions on national and regional economic priorities for SCDI members.

SCDI membership continues to grow and we have been delighted to welcome a whole new range of members, large and small, representative of all sectors and geographies.


We have delivered over 50 strategic events in the past year including political engagement, influencer and thought leadership events through to large conferences and awards dinners. These programmes are generously supported by our members and partners.

The impact of these key gatherings has been to inspire and engage private, public and indeed all aspects of Civic Scotland in the wider economic discussion. This critical input has enabled us to shape and design our strategic thinking and policy activity to ensure Scotland's economy is agile and well placed to respond to the macroeconomic challenges and opportunities which lie ahead.

2017/18 and beyond will be no different and we look forward to working with you in the months ahead.

Central Scotland

SCDI continued to inform, influence and inspire the business and political environment across Central Scotland







during 2016/17, through our policy work and aligned engagement and event schedule.

A varied, stimulating and thoughtprovoking programme in excess of 30 events was delivered and allowed members and stakeholders to participate and contribute to Scotland's economic growth.

The Annual Forum remains the leading policy, economic and networking event in the SCDI calendar and took place on March 16th and 17th March. Supported by our strategic partners, economic growth and wealth creation were central themes to the Forum, with topics ranging from industry

& skills 4.0 to inclusive growth and natural capital.

SCDI members had the opportunity to engage with Scottish and UK Government representatives both at Forum 2017 and throughout the year, via the Political Challenge Series, SCDI Influencer Series and roundtable events, supported by our partners.

Government representatives included Keith Brown MSP, Cabinet Secretary for Economy, Jobs & Fair Work, The Scottish Government; The Rt Hon David Mundell, Secretary of State for Scotland, UK Government; Mark Garnier MP, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for the Department for International Trade, UK Government; and Derek McKay MSP, Cabinet Secretary for Finance and the Constitution, The Scottish Government.

Leading industry and political figures engaged with SCDI across a range of current issues including Brexit and digital, with the programme informed by the Blueprint focus on productivity, innovation, internationalisation and infrastructure investment.

SCDI also facilitated discussions with international representatives, including roundtables with US Embassy Officers, the Ethiopian Ambassador and Foreign and Commonwealth Office Heads of Mission.

The business engagement programme provided updates on SCDI policy plans and priorities, alongside the opportunity to network with fellow SCDI members.

North East

The 2016/17 period in the North East was characterised by a continuation of the economic downturn precipitated by the sudden decline in oil price from mid-2014 onwards. Cutbacks in investment and a drive for improved efficiency across the oil and gas sector led to job losses, downsizing and the closure of many businesses. However, the 2017 period, aided by a more stable and slowly rising oil price, led to some optimism that the worst of the downturn was over. This was reflected by an increase in the mergers and acquisitions activity across the sector



and an increase in passenger numbers at Aberdeen International Airport, after several years of decline.

As SCDI reflects the economy, retaining members – and the scope for recruiting new members – was limited. Despite this, the level of resignations was not significantly greater than previous years and new members continued to be recruited. This was achieved by maintaining an active member visit and events programme. 22 events were organised during the 2016/17 period and attendance, both in terms of numbers and seniority of attendee, remained high.

The flagship event was SCDI's 13th Annual Lecture, at which Martin Temple CBE, Chair, Health & Safety Executive, was guest speaker. It was attended by 240 members and guests on 19th January 2017 at Ardoe House Hotel & Spa.

Throughout the year, policy submissions were made by the North East Committee to the Scottish Government on the impact of the Business Rates increase and to Aberdeen City Council regarding proposals for a new Aberdeen Football Club stadium and training complex at Kingsford. On the latter the Regional Director gave verbal evidence to the Council's Pre-Determination Hearing in September 2017.

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Membership

Highlands & Islands

2016/17 saw tourism and food and drink flourishing across the Highlands and Islands with visitor numbers up and continued investment across whisky distillation, salmon production, and other sectors. In particular, the acquisition of the Lochaber smelter by the GFG Alliance with their growth ambitions is a real boost to the West Highlands. Access to labour and the provision or sufficient housing to meet growth are an increasing challenge for businesses in the face of an aging population but there remains strong optimism for the future.

Over 2016/17 SCDI held a host of events focused on the Inverness and Highland City Region Deal to help businesses and organisations understand the projects that were taken forward as part of that Deal. This included events in Inverness with Professor Andrew Morris the Chief Scientist at the Scottish Government Health Directorate, with Keith Brown MSP the Cabinet Secretary for Economy, Jobs and Fair Work, as well as a dinner in Fort William with Paul Wheelhouse, Minister for Business, Innovation & Energy. We also held a dinner with Paul Mason, the Director of Emerging & Enabling Technologies at Innovate UK, in Elgin, and at Inverness Airport in support of new KLM services.

In September we held the eighteenth SCDI Highlands and Islands Annual Dinner and Business Excellence

Young Engineers and Science Clubs

SCDI's Young Engineers and Science Clubs (YESC) Scotland progamme has played a key role in inspiring young people towards STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) careers for almost 30 years.

The YESC programme exists to support Scotland's future economy by informing and inspiring young people about STEM subjects and careers, through a range of innovative projects and exciting events.

2016/17 saw a further 135 schools across Scotland join our network bringing the total number of schools registered with YESC to over 1,500; representing 90% of Scottish secondary schools and 61% Scottish primary schools across all 32 local authority areas, with an estimated membership of over 35,000 boys and girls.

Our annual Celebration of STEM took place in June at Glasgow Science Centre, with hundreds of young engineers & scientists showcasing their work to industry experts and taking part in a series of STEM challenges including the national final for this year's annual STEM challenge: Construct a Crane, supported by EnerMech.

The Club of the Year Awards went to Mearns Primary, East Renfrewshire, and Monifieth High School, Angus.

Regional Celebrations of STEM also took place in Dundee, Aberdeen, Inverness and Ayrshire throughout March.

Programme highlights 2016-17

- Provided 720 grants and STEM resources to schools including Raspberry Pis to support development of digital skills.
- By popular demand we developed and launched a new first level project, Little Lighthouse, to engage P2-4 pupils in almost 100 schools to develop STEM knowledge and skills.
- 226 schools took part in Construct a Crane challenge with EnerMech.
- 13 primary schools in Orkney took part in a solar panel investigation and presented findings as part of Orkney International Science Festival in September 2017.
- 59 secondary schools took part in the 3rd year of the Tomorrow's Engineers Energy Quest programme.
