FOREWORD


I very much hope that you enjoy reading our latest Annual Report and that it gives you a sense of the breadth and depth of SCDI's operations.

We continue to live in challenging times, but some of those challenges also bring opportunities. While Covid 19 continues to be a challenge, our two most recent Forum events (in November 2021 and June 2022) were held in person once again, and it feels as if there is something of a return to normality.

However, we cannot, and should not, try to recreate the pre-pandemic economy. That pre-pandemic economy was failing too many people in society and there is an opportunity for civic society in Scotland to work together to create a new prosperity for all of Scotland.

The theme of our forum in June 2022 was "a new sense of purpose" and that theme resonated with both speakers and audience participants. As a membership organisation bringing together so many different players in Scotland's economy, we help to shape both government and business thinking and our aim is to deliver practical actions that address both social and business challenges.

In our 2021 blueprint for Scotland ("Making a good living") we recommended that Scotland should aim to be a global hub for purposeful businesses that profitably solve the problems of people and planet. To address this, in a joint initiative with the Scottish Government, we set up the Business Purpose Commission for Scotland. The Business Purpose




Commission's report presents not just a call to action but practical recommendations to help businesses undertake that journey to nurture their business purposes.

- the updating of SQA qualifications to reflect current needs and future requirements
- investment to scale up existing assets in Further and Higher Education and in programmes that have been shown to be successful such as peer-to-peer learning, coding for schools and young engineers and science clubs
- the exploration of programmes such as Teach Now which could be used to bring more IT professionals into teaching

In addition to our own thought leadership work we collaborated with key stakeholders to inform thinking through our participation in events, research and reports led by our members including the Climate Emergency Response Group (CERG).

Building on the success of 2020's Green recovery report our Clean Growth Leadership Group developed a Manifesto for clean growth.

The group brought together business leaders from business, industry, academia, local government and the public sector. The group identified clean growth opportunities for industry, energy, transport, places, people, finance and nature and 21 priority actions to maximise them.

Many of these were reflected in the Scottish Government's <u>Climate change plan 2018–2032</u> <u>update</u> including:


- the bringing forward of the ban on new petrol and diesel cars to 2030
- increased support for clean growth innovation across the energy sector, such as hydrogen and carbon capture and storage (CCS), through a new £180m Emerging energy technologies fund and a new £5m Carbon capture and utilisation challenge fund
- new regulations and support to build an internationally competitive domestic supply chain for the renewables sector, including new requirements for developers to include supply chain commitments when applying to the ScotWind leasing process run by Crown Estate Scotland

- new incentives and support for farmers and crofters to reverse biodiversity loss and increase sustainability through new environmental conditionality requirements, scaled-up Agricultural Transformation Programme and enhanced advice services
- a new and expanded energy efficiency and retrofit programme to replace Warmer Homes Scotland from 2022
- greater support for green upskilling of public procurement personnel to better implement sustainable procurement duties and mobilise public spending for net zero
- exploring options to incentivise the production and use of sustainable aviation fuel
- working with UK Government and other devolved administrations to agree and implement a UK Emissions Trading Scheme
- strengthen controls and protections for peatlands
- increased public investment, and the development of new incentives to increase private investment, in peatland restoration and woodland creation



Scotland's social, economic and natural resources – from our skilled workforce and unrivalled landscape, to our innovative businesses and world-class colleges and universities – give us unique advantages which we can leverage to capture the economic value of the global transition to net zero.

Our vision is for Scotland to be a world leader in clean growth which delivers for people, for our economy and for our planet.



ENERGY – HARNESSING THE VALUE FOR PEOPLE AND PLACES

The community benefits that onshore wind farm development can bring are well understood but how do we ensure the economic opportunity that leasing our seabed for wind farm developments represents is harnessed for the benefit of our people and places? Ahead of the ScotWind programme round in 2021 our webinar and report explored how we might unlock the benefits for rural and coastal communities through supply chain development and community engagement.

CLIMATE TECH

Scotland has the potential to harness new and emerging digital technologies such as 5G, artificial intelligence and data analytics to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and mitigate the impacts of climate change according to our Innovation critical report. The report identifies key challenges for climate tech in Scotland and proposes recommendations to grow Scotland's climate tech sector and deliver a transition to net zero by 2045, which can create green jobs and boosts exports, innovation and productivity.

HEALTH AND DATA

The pandemic served as a reminder that a healthy society underpins a healthy economy. Access to real-world health & social care data informed and enhanced decision-making and policy design saving lives and livelihoods throughout the crisis.

Our Mind the gap report highlighted the gap between the data we currently collect and the data we need and could collect, utilise or share in the future and how better use of data and technology could transform Scotland's health and social care sectors. The report estimates the value of data to be worth £800 million each year with estimated savings of almost 40% of its current budget for NHS Scotland to reinvest.

The report informed our response to the Scottish Government's Health & Social Care Data strategy consultation.











REPORT PARTNERS

A VISION FOR SCOTLAND

We asked our members what Scotland should be known for in the global economy of 2030.

Our blueprint, <u>Making a good living</u>, identifies the opportunities we have before us and makes 12 recommendations to address:

- the transition to net zero carbon emissions
- an aging society
- slow population growth
- technological change
- slow growth and low productivity
- social inequalities

Many of the recommendations assist in the delivery of the <u>National Strategy for Economic Transformation</u> and we continue to work closely with both governments to ensure our priority themes are reflected in UK and Scottish policy.

Early actions include:

- The launch of a Business Purpose Commission for Scotland
- The introduction of a Moveable Transactions Bill to make it easier for businesses and individuals to raise finance using moveable assets
- A commitment to the further decarbonisation of transport including investment in the development of a high-value manufacturing base for low-volume, high-value zero-emission vehicles
- A major investment in active travel infrastructure
- The publication of a Wellbeing Economy Index to track progress towards broader economic and social goals
- Measures to further boost productivity in the foundational economy including the establishment of a Centre for Workplace Transformation and a further expansion of Productivity Clubs
- Implementing the next phase of the Green Jobs Workforce Academy





- We continued to offer opportunities to **Meet** the politician, securing Ivan McKee MSP, Rt Hon Sir Edward Davey MP, and Kwasi Kwarteng MP. We hosted an Energy and the **Environment Hustings to allow** representatives from political parties to present their policies ahead of the Scottish parliamentary elections.
- Ten speakers from a variety of sectors including energy, education, and tech joined our Blueprint talks series covering innovation, the future of places post-pandemic, lifelong learning, and the future purpose of business.
- Climate tech was a hot topic for members. with several events culminating in the launch of our Innovation Critical report. Members also had the chance to hear about Scotland's Tech Revolution, and learn about efforts to close Scotland's data gap, in two other techfocused events.

PRODUCTIVITY

Productivity remains a major challenge for the Scottish economy.

Our peer to peer learning clubs are designed to help small businesses and other organisations to improve their performance.

We provided SMEs with the opportunity to get better at what they do by focussing on different themes including purpose, leadership, collaboration, fair work, apprenticeships, digital marketing, e-commerce, digital transformation, collaboration and process changes.

We held 25 events and an annual conference.

Launching pilots in Edinburgh and Glasgow the club was expanded to the North East, Highlands and Islands and South of Scotland in 2020. Membership grew throughout the year.

<u>Productivity Clubs Scotland</u> continues to work closely with key stakeholders including Scottish Enterprise, the Productivity Institute and other industries and sectors to deliver the best possible speakers and support for attendees.

INSPIRING THE NEXT GENERATION

Technological transformation and the journey to net-zero bring exciting opportunities for a better economy but having enough people with the right skills is critical to Scotland's ability to compete globally.

Employers' need for scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians is even greater now than when we set up our Young Engineers and Science Clubs (YESC) in 1987 to open young people's eyes to the opportunities and help them make the right choices.

Our team inspire young people by co-designing bespoke classroom activities with industry, giving them an insight into the world of work and real-life challenges to be overcome.

With support from industry, the programme has grown to be one of the largest extra-curricular Science Technology Engineering and Maths (STEM) schools outreach programmes reaching every part of the country, with coverage in all 32 local authorities.

The team moved quickly to online delivery and hybrid events, flexing the format for teacher CPD and reaching the whole class remotely.

We engaged with more pupils than ever before reaching a more diverse audience and increasing the number of STEMs kits delivered.

66.6% (146) of schools were in the top 25% BME (Black or minority ethnic pupil percentages), FSM (Free School Meal recipient percentages), 25% most deprived by SIMD (Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation) or UR5/6 (Remote / Accessible Rural areas). This is a 4.1% increase on last year. 84.5% (185) in the top 50% SIMD or UR 5/6 with above average BME and FSM.


The members of SCDI continue to be bound together by a shared desire to see Scotland prosper. I love the word prosperity.
