FROM THE CHAIR


Much has changed since our inception 90 years ago. We no longer build industrial estates, organise international exhibitions, have offices in North America to expand our exports, or run trade missions across the world. That work we pioneered and delivered for decades blazed the trail that others have followed and many of these responsibilities have rightly been taken on by government.

It might be said also that much has not changed; we were established in the face of the 1930s depression, brought about by uncontrolled speculation. Fast forward to the 2000s and again, uncontrolled speculation brought about another severe depression – the difference is that we now face a crisis of existence brought about by uncontrolled growth that has maximised solely profit at the expense of the planet and our common good.

The troubling weather events of recent times are harbingers of what is to come if there is not rapid action to reduce carbon production dramatically and substantially invest in the restoration of biodiversity. The urgency and difficulty of this task is underlined by carbon production worldwide increasing every year, regardless of the scientific advice going back decades and previous agreements such as the 2015 Paris Accords.

COP26 in Glasgow and COP15 in Kunming offer the possibility of further international agreement but it will be delivery in each country that will be critical. The changes required need to be deep, sustained and, as it means that 'business as normal' is not possible, there are going to be difficulties that can be only overcome by civic agreement. As Scotland's leading civic body this is a key role that we can play in finding solutions that, if not universally welcome, are acceptable and that ensure that the urgent changes required benefit all in general and bring no disbenefit to some.

Our members continue to demonstrate the same vision, energy and practical delivery that our founders displayed. Your continuing contribution ensures SCDI helps to shape government and industry thinking and to deliver practical action addressing social and business challenges including low productivity and the need to inspire the next generation of scientists and engineers. Our work remains vital to the delivery of a safer, healthier and more equitable Scotland in which all life can flourish.

THOUGHT LEADERSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

New Scottish and UK government initiatives which reflect recommendations from SCDI reports during this period include:

- £100m Green Jobs Fund
- £60m Youth Guarantee
- £25m National Transition Training Fund
- Expanding Community Wealth Building strategies
- Accelerated funding for energy efficiency and domestic retrofit programmes
- UK <u>Green Jobs Taskforce</u> to advise on green jobs and reskilling workers

Other positive developments include:

- The reform of the Flexible Workforce
 Development Fund with extended eligibility, increased funding and raised ceiling
- Scottish Government's Careers Strategy echoed recommendations from our Upskilling Scotland report including up-to-date advice, technology trends and improved industry links
- The shaping of UK and Scottish economic recovery plans to reflect net-zero and biodiversity opportunities including the work of the <u>Advisory Group on Economic Recovery</u> led by Benny Higgins
- An increase in provision of bitesize and flexible learning by colleges and universities

THOUGHT LEADERSHIP

BUILDING SCOTLAND'S GREEN RECOVERY

Our <u>Building Scotland's Green Recovery</u> report laid the groundwork for December's Clean Growth Manifesto, which identified opportunities in the transition to net-zero.

The report called for government, employers, workers, citizens and communities to work together to tackle the climate emergency with the same urgency as we responded to the public health emergency Covid-19 presented. Our plan had 12 big ideas for kick-starting the Scottish economy, creating new green jobs and accelerating our progress to net-zero including a large-scale green stimulus to target investment in buildings retrofit, low and zero carbon transport infrastructure, nature-based solutions and digital connectivity.

Our Clean Growth policy work was overseen by 16 SCDI members.































The Clean Growth Leadership Group evolved the January 2020 Statement of Vision and Principles to a two-stage plan for Scotland's green recovery from the pandemic.



UPSKILLING SCOTLAND

THE FUTURE OF SKILLS AND THE FOURTH INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION

Technological change is transforming our economy and our society.

The Fourth Industrial Revolution, characterised by breakthroughs in technologies such as automation, artificial intelligence (AI), digitisation and 'big data', is disrupting the world of work and changing the skills Scotland needs to compete and thrive on the global stage. Our Upskilling Scotland report, published in January 2020, explored these changes and underlined the need for a paradigm shift in how employers, workers, educators and government invest in learning to keep pace with change.

The impact of our report on informing government responses is testament to SCDI's continued influence in the skills space.

INSPRING THE NEXT GENERATION OF YOUNG ENGINEERS AND SCIENTISTS

Engineers, scientists, mathematicians, and people with technological skills and know-how are vital to Scotland's economic success.

They will transform lives for the better and find the solutions to the challenges and opportunities which climate change and digital transformation present. The scale and pace of disruption means the need to enthuse and attract the next generation of innovators and problem solvers to our employers is even greater now than when we established our Young Engineering and Science Clubs (YESC) in 1987. Working in partnership with our members, our schools outreach team

provide support for teachers and business and industry alike. They develop and deliver hands-on activities which help young people understand the challenges and involve them in creating the solutions. In a year where those furthest away from the labour market suffered disproportionately, our team focused their efforts on areas of social deprivation and rural isolation as well as underrepresented groups in the Science Technology Engineering and Maths (STEM) careers including girls and young women.

BACK TO THE FUTURE

The pandemic has shown us what can be achieved when organisations across the public, private and third-sector align behind a common goal and shared values. SCDI is unique in uniting all three for an economy which enables people and nature to flourish.

WW2 was invoked by many at the onset of the economic crisis which followed the Covid-19 pandemic, but many have forgotten a leading figure who led Scotland through its darkest hour. Concerned that wartime production was concentrated in the Midlands, the then Secretary for State for Scotland Tom Johnston set up the Scottish Council on Industry. Bringing together Chambers of Commerce, the STUC, the Royal Burghs and councils, and government, they soon attracted 700 businesses and 90,000 new jobs to Scotland.

They had bold ambitions for a better economy and came together to prepare for the industries and infrastructure which would shape post-war Scotland. They laid the foundations for hydro-electric power, the new towns of the 1940s, which attracted US electronic plants to Scotland's new industrial estates, and the start of the modern tourism industry with a new Scottish Tourism Board – a key industry which needs our support now more than ever. Nowhere was their ambition more apparent than in the creation of the NHS, to which we owe our lives and livelihoods.

75 years on the Council's values live on in SCDI. What we learnt this year has helped us think differently and create our Making a Good Living



Report, which looks forward 10 years to the kind of economy we aspire to be. The post-WW2 world was quickly divided by an Iron Curtain. Some want to use this crisis to reassemble barriers between countries and communities. SCDI has always been a strong advocate for international trade and whilst our focus remains on supporting Scotland's economy, Scotland has an opportunity to lead and to reap the benefits from the energy transition and digital transformation.

Your continued support of SCDI, through what has been an extraordinarily challenging year for all of us, sends a message about your commitment to a better Scotland and we look forward to continuing to work with you to build a prosperous economy which works for people and planet.
