FROM THE CHAIR Proud to have headed a unique organisation

I am certain SCDI will continue to play a vital role in informed, impartial and evidence-led policy discussion. This is at the heart of




SCDI's ethos, and our contributions remain relevant, well researched and highly respected.

FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE Committed to helping Scotland's growth

Despite the challenging economic and operating environment we have continued to make significant progress against our objectives and policy priorities.

We remain committed and focused in delivering our Blueprint for Scotland, which outlines the ambitions and vision we have as an organisation to deliver sustainable economic growth for Scotland and the role that our members and international networks can play in supporting the delivery of those objectives.

Through doubling exports, increasing our skills and talent pool, investing in infrastructure, maximising the opportunities from our natural assets including oil and gas and water, improving connectivity and market access and by recognising the key role that Scotland's cities will play in driving economic growth, we believe that we can step change Future Scotland.

But we also recognise that this will be achieved through partnership working and effective collaboration. Therefore, this year we have refocused our energies and efforts to demonstrate added value to our members and to ensure that we link effectively to our member network of knowledge, expertise and skills to help inform the economic agenda and policy debate in Scotland on our key priorities.

With the expansion of our activities in London, the investment of additional staff resources in the Highlands and Islands and the increased focus on delivering added value to members, we have seen growth in our membership numbers. We have also continued our programme of investment in the organisation to support our core work, strengthening our marketing and digital communications to help drive our promotional activity and to strengthen our members' voice to key audiences.

Our commitment to young people has also ensured that we have grown our Young Engineers & Science Club network to more than 550 clubs, with 10,000 young people looking to develop knowledge and skills in STEM subjects in schools across Scotland. We have also engaged a new generation of business leaders in our policy work and linked to our international networks.

And we remain committed to working with partners to deliver the economic legacy for Scotland from the Commonwealth Games and Ryder Cup in 2014.

We have also continued to work towards improving the efficiency and effectiveness of the organisation by investing and upgrading our ICT infrastructure and software, updating our HR processes and establishing a Graduate Development Programme, resulting in the appointment of five new graduates. We continue to work with pension trustees and advisers to meet our pension obligations whist ensuring we invest in the business to ensure its sustainability. Cost savings have been realised following the relocation of the Glasgow office, and overhead costs remain closely monitored and controlled.

I remain confident that despite the economic challenges and uncertainties ahead, SCDI is well placed to support, inform and lead the policy debate on behalf of our members, to help deliver sustainable economic growth for Scotland.

SCDI continues, through our unrivalled network of members and stakeholders, to offer the leadership and vision to ensure our nation is globally competitive and fulfils the potential of our people and our assets.

Since its founding in 1931, the focus of SCDI has remained ensuring that Scotland maximises its opportunities to create a successful and sustainable economy. This role is even more critical in the current economic environment of uncertainty, challenge and constant change.

This year we have continued to work towards delivering our strategic 10-year *Blueprint for Scotland* on behalf of members. We remain focused on delivering against three key policy areas:

- Building an outward and enterprising nation;
- Maximising Scotland's assets;
 Realising the potential of our
- people.

SCDI recognises that an economically successful Scotland must also be fully connected in energy, digital and transport. To achieve this, Scotland must be an enterprising and collaborative nation with clear international ambitions which are supported by world-class infrastructure and public service delivery.

To achieve this ambition, we worked in partnership in 2011-12 on our priority targets:

- Double the value of Scotland's exports;
- Ensure the full-wiring of Scotland to high-speed broadband;
- Maintain the international competitiveness of our universities and colleges;
- Grow our international air route network and bring HS2 to Scotland;
- Develop and deliver a transformational skills programme to meet growth ambitions and tackle youth unemployment.

A key aspect of our role and focus is to seek to work in partnership with our members and stakeholders to facilitate informed and constructive debate and discussion on issues of relevance to our policy priorities and to our members.

In 2011-12 we continued to work with our 1200 members across Scotland and the UK to inform and support our policy activity. This year more than 100 policy events were held involving 7000 members, strategic influencers and stakeholders.

This year, we also commenced a wider programme of engagement on behalf of our members to identify and determine those issues As part of this programme, SCDI was invited to facilitate a private strategic meeting with the Rt Hon David Cameron MP, Prime Minister, during his visit to Scotland in July. The meeting was also attended by a number of SCDI board members and the Rt Hon David Mundell MP, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State, with a focused discussion on key economic issues and the challenges and opportunities facing Scotland linked to the constitutional debate.

Our work with members on political engagement takes place

ENGAGING AND DELIVERING

Building on our strengths to develop a 'Future Scotland'

It is through our detailed policy, analysis and research work that SCDI seeks to develop innovative and practical policy solutions. We also undertake a comprehensive programme of policy work to support our members. A key aspect of this includes consultation responses.

SCDI continues to lead the debate on behalf of members through our policy submissions to Scottish, UK Governments, European Commission and local Government as well as to a number of nongovernmental organisations and agencies. This year we submitted 31 responses on their behalf.

Research and Analysis

SCDI has a strong track record of delivering research to inform policy and support economic development. This year we have strengthened our research team

and be incorporated into *Fast Track* Scotland – Making the Case for High Speed Rail Connections with Scotland, published by Transport Scotland.

A Scotland-wide business survey to inform our response on key issues to Network Rail's Edinburgh-Glasgow Improvement Programme consultation and Transport Scotland's Rail 2014 consultation.

The Scotland-wide Skills Pulse Survey, launched in September in partnership with Skills Development Scotland. The aim of this study is to capture, analyse and disseminate Scottish employers' views on skills and business need. This is a biannual survey to establish benchmarks and monitor improvements in skills support over time.

Two additional surveys were also developed and implemented this year, for launch over the next 12 months. These are the *Hydro Nation Survey of International Activity*, in

and extended the range of research and analysis to support members. Specific research activity undertaken in 2011-12 included:

The Survey of International Activity in the oil and gas sector, now in its 13th year, which is recognised by business, academia and the wider economic community, as a key report of sector performance.

A Scotland-wide business survey on air links both for our response to the UK aviation framework, and a specific West Central Scotland survey in collaboration with Glasgow City Marketing Bureau to support air route development.

 A Central Scotland business survey on high-speed rail to inform partnership with Scottish Water, and a study into the dualling of the A9/ A96 in partnership with Transport Scotland.

Leading the Debate

SCDI's Annual Forum continues to be the leading policy and strategic networking event in the Scottish business and economic calendar. The 2012 Forum focused our key policy themes of People, Assets, Cities, Energy and Nation.

SMART Scotland: Delivering our Ambitions, the 41st SCDI Forum and Economic Summit at Fairmont St Andrews, saw some 250 senior delegates – a record number – engage with senior leaders and influencers from the UK and Europe to identify and agree steps Scotland must take to achieve our vision for sustainable economic growth.

Delegates examined Scotland's global competitiveness, our Smart Assets and Smart Energy potential as well as learning about the potential of Smart Cities through effective collaboration. The Forum also engaged with our next generation of young leaders through the innovative #4MyGen parallel Forum, which engaged and inspired Scotland's future civic leaders on key aspects of our policy programme.

Over the two days of the Forum, SCDI collated and shared the ideas and solutions coming forward from all delegates and ensured the integration of the debate and outcomes with wider policy programmes and activity.

Launching the event with a strategic overview of the global economic environment, Prof Stephane Garelli, Director of the World Competitiveness Centre and former Managing Director of the World Economic Forum, challenged our current thinking and raised our horizons to global opportunities for Scotland.

"Scotland is a land of the future. But the future is not what it used to be," he said. "New markets, new consumer behaviours, new brands and new business models are emerging beyond Europe and the US. The world is full of opportunities, but to succeed governments and business leaders will need to get better at working together to ensure an economic environment, which is more resilient and more success driven. In the end, we also compete through developing the right mindset."



together to discuss the new opportunities discovered off our shores, learn lessons from the international experience and influence developments in ways that benefited Scotland's future prosperity and wellbeing, ensuring the nation identified and invested in the potential that North Sea oil and gas could bring to the UK and Scotland.

Forty years on, SCDI held another strategic conference focusing on the future for the oil and gas industry, bringing together more than 200 current and future key industry and business leaders to work in partnership to ensure continued success in this vital sector for Scotland's economy.

Global Ambitions

Promoting Scotland's capabilities and excellence globally continues to be a key priority for the organisation. We recognise that economic recovery will be export driven and it is vital to encourage more Scottish businesses to capitalise on the growing economic potential in some of the world's most exciting and dynamic international markets.

Our track record of delivery of practical trade support for Scottish businesses continued with five focused trade delegations to key markets.

This included the largest delegation from Scotland to Brazil, led by the Secretary of State for Scotland, Rt Hon Michael Moore MP. The visit to Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo involved 25 companies

Outcomes and Achievements

Critical to the policy and engagement work that SCDI undertakes is our ability to influence and support the development of government and local economic development policy on behalf of our members both directly and through the consultation responses outlined on page nine of this report.

Significant policy successes this year include:

- Scottish Budget prioritisation of infrastructure investment, including housing, transport and digital.
- Incentives to increase North Sea oil and gas investment and amendments to proposed European regulation to safeguard health and safety regime.
- Investment in cross-border rail services and safeguarding of sleeper and direct services to the north of Scotland.

- Action on youth unemployment with Scotland's large employers and the Youth Employment Strategy.
- Proposals to enhance academia-business links.
- Increased funding for Scotland's colleges.
- Proposals to promote science, technology, engineering and maths subjects in the education system.
- Proposals to reduce electricity transmission charging from northern Scotland.
- Proposals to develop the economic value of Scotland's water assets.
- The launch of Scotland's Cities Strategy.

In addition, we continue to make considerable progress, in partnership with our members, in shaping the economic future of Scotland across a broad range of issues and policy discussions.

from a range of sectors including energy, financial services, creative industries, education, construction, and professional services.

As one of the fastest-growing markets in the world, with a growing consumer class, Brazil is a key market for Scotland to exploit. The visit included strategic meetings with the organisers of the Brazil World Cup in 2014 and the Rio 2016 Olympics to explore opportunities to build on Scotland's expertise in major event delivery following the Commonwealth Games in 2014.

SCDI's trade visit to China and Hong Kong was led by the First Minister of Scotland, Alex Salmond MSP. Twenty Scottish companies visited two of the most vibrant and economically active cities in China, Guangzhou and Shenzhen – markets in their own right but also key economic gateways to the Pearl River Delta, the manufacturing hotspot of the world. In addition to these visits, the delegation continued to exploit the significant market opportunities in Hong Kong – consistently one of SCDI's most

successful markets with more than 40 visits in our history.

We continued to build on our successful relationships in India and the Middle East with a trade visit to Delhi and Mumbai in October and a visit to Dubai and Doha in February.

This was SCDI's 14th trade visit to India and the visit generated around £190,000-worth of business for Scottish companies. The visit to Dubai and Doha generated around £205,000-worth of business for the 12 participating companies from sectors including education and training, business and professional services, and energy.

We also delivered a second successful visit to Chicago and New York City in partnership with Glasgow City Council during Scotland Week. The visit was led by the Lord Provost of Glasgow, Bob Winter, who also led the 2011 visit to Toronto and New York. Following the visit, the 15 participating companies anticipate £2.7m-worth of orders in the next 12 months.

Over the coming year, we will continue to work with our members to support their global ambitions. In December 2012 we will take a delegation to Germany in partnership with Glasgow City Council. A group of Glasgow-based companies from a wide range of sectors will participate on this visit, which will build upon the city's established links in its twinned city, Nuremberg.

The Scottish Cities Alliance: A £7m drive for economic success

Building on SCDI's leading role in bringing together Scotland's Cities, SCDI has continued to drive forward the development of Scotland's cities strategy – *Scotland's Cities: Delivering for Scotland* – and was confirmed as strategic facilitator and host organisation of the Scottish Cities Alliance in 2011.

Charged with delivering economic success and new jobs, the Scottish Cities Alliance has access to a £7m fund to deliver a series of collaborative projects including Digital Connectivity, Sustainability, International Promotion and Smart Ticketing.

SCDI will continue to work with the seven cities, Aberdeen, Dundee, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Inverness, Perth and Stirling, and the Scottish Government, to stimulate economic growth, create new jobs and business opportunities.

Importantly, the partnership, which is facilitated and chaired by SCDI, will develop Scotland's potential as a competitive and world class place to live, work, invest and do business.

Scottish Cities Forum

The 2012 Scottish Cities Forum, facilitated by SCDI, brought together key public, private and third sector stakeholders to tackle the opportunities and challenges faced by global cities.

Focusing on the themes of collaboration and development, the conference set out a vision for successful, outward-looking and productive Scottish cities.

Some 200 senior delegates attended the Forum and keynote speakers included: lan Abbott-Donnelly, IBM; James Alexander, SCDI; Brendan Dick, BT Scotland; Jim Duffy, Entrepreneurial Spark; Geoff Duke, Scottish Cities Alliance; George Kirk, ScottishPower; Prof

This year we have increased our activity to support members' interests at a Scotland-wide level and also invested to develop and grow our membership base, influence and engagement activities in London.

We also continued to support Scotland's ambitions to deliver a lasting economic and international legacy from the Commonwealth Games and Ryder Cup in 2014.

Scotland-wide

With a Scotland-wide member network supported by regional offices in the Highlands and Islands and North East, SCDI can ensure that we drive forward the agenda of economic growth for Scotland's regions.

Working with area committees of senior influencers and experts, this structure ensures that we are able to engage directly on policy issues of local and significant relevance to business and civic groups within these regions. Key issues progressed in the year included lobbying the UK Secretary of State for Transport on the need to retain access to

Heathrow, the UK's hub airport, for air services from the north of Scotland. We also successfully engaged with the EC Energy Commissioner on their proposals to create a new regulatory regime for offshore health and safety. The issue remains live but it is hoped the position of SCDI, Oil & Gas UK and others that a directive, which causes no damage to the world-leading safety and environmental protection regime in the UKCS, rather than regulation, is the route taken by the EC. SCDI is concerned that full-scale new regulation could cause a hiatus in investment, with consequent risks

to employment and the long-term future of the industry.

We strongly welcomed the UK Supreme Court decision to dismiss the latest legal challenge to the Aberdeen Western Peripheral Route and urge the Scottish Government to progress the project to construction as quickly as possible.

In addition to these key policy influences in the region, we continue to drive an active programme of political and membership events for our members. The Annual Lecture in Aberdeen was held in January

at the Marcliffe Hotel with the keynote speaker being Jim McColl OBE, Chairman and Chief Executive, Clyde Blowers Ltd. Attracting more than 300 of Aberdeen's most senior influencers as well as leaders from across Scotland, this is now established as one of the mustattend events in the North East business calendar. It sets the agenda for our year of activity in Aberdeen and ensures SCDI is continuing to lead the debate on the key issues affecting the North East economy.

In the Highlands and Islands we have continued to play a leading role as the economic voice for the region. We were successful in lobbying for plans to start and stop the crossborder rail services in Edinburgh to be scrapped and were the leading advocate over the route of the proposed Inverness bypass. SCDI has also been a strong voice on the taxation regime for the oil and gas sector and for the development of renewable energy around the region. With youth employment rightly regarded as a key priority in the region, SCDI worked in partnership with businesses and key stakeholders to facilitate a summit in March addressed by the First Minister of Scotland. This explored the challenges facing young people in the region and the steps needed to help them reach their potential.

In addition to an active programme of political engagement, a series of strategic events has been held connecting our members throughout the region. The key highlight in the Highlands and Islands calendar continues to be the SCDI Highlands and Islands Business Excellence Awards. Now in its 13th year, SCDI continues to recognise inspiring effort, drive and innovation of the many world-class businesses and organisations which choose to do business in this key location.

London

This year we have seen a significant increase in SCDI's activity in London, working towards the strategic aim of SCDI being the business gateway to the Scottish economy in the capital. Involving our network of members actively as a forum for policy and issuebased discussion, SCDI champions the Scottish policy agenda in London and communicates current business, economic and political developments to key decisionmakers.

With the support of a new Chair, and a revitalised London

Linking London 2012 and Glasgow 2014, we delivered a series of events to showcase Glasgow's capabilities and business expertise across key sectors including financial services, energy, life sciences and tourism.

A programme of strategic networking events took place in Dover House, with the permission of the Rt Hon Michael Moore MP, Secretary of State for Scotland, and included a strategic networking lunch with the leader of Glasgow City Council, Cllr Gordon Matheson, and an evening reception with Mr Moore.

The London 2012 programme also involved a working session with Siemens on Glasgow's energy, engineering and sustainability agenda.

Siemens hosted this event at its

showcase facility: The Crystal, a landmark building situated in London's Green Enterprise District, which is the world's largest exhibition focused on urban sustainability.

We ensured that our members were fully updated and aware of business engagement activity at Scotland House during the Olympic fortnight, working with Scottish Enterprise to showcase Scottish business excellence and opportunities in key sectors, to visiting delegations and SCDI's own international networks.

In addition, we worked with several of our members to help promote their support of the 2012 Games in London to a wider business and civic audience and to ensure that Scottish organisations received the opportunity to share experiences and lessons linked to major event delivery.

Committee, this year we also implemented a regular policy engagement programme with key London decisionmakers in support of our policy priorities. We have successfully introduced our Strategic Influencers model in London and this year delivered three events, with the Rt Hon Danny Alexander MP, Chief Secretary to the Treasury; the Secretary of State for Scotland, Rt Hon Michael Moore MP; and John Swinney MSP, the Scottish **Government Cabinet Secretary** for Finance Employment and Sustainable Growth.

In addition, we have enhanced our focus on membership engagement and recruitment and this has resulted in the recruitment of new members who are keen to more actively engage in wider Scottish policy discussions. SCDI London members have also engaged in wider policy discussions, covering transport and connectivity, sustainability, inward investment and Scotland's constitutional debate. London will remain a key focus for membership development activity over the next 12 months.

Glasgow 2014 and 2018 Youth Olympic Games Bid

SCDI continues to play a leading role in supporting Scotland's efforts to build on the legacy from both the Olympic Games in 2012 and Glasgow 2014. Following a highly successful visit by Lord Green to Glasgow in June 2011, organised by SCDI, we also welcomed Lord Howell, Minister of State for Foreign & Commonwealth, to Glasgow in January 2012.

The visit included an organised tour of key economic growth

areas in the city of Glasgow, with a particular focus on the areas being regenerated for the Commonwealth Games in 2014 and the opportunity to engage with SCDI members and stakeholders working to deliver the economic legacy from the Commonwealth Games.

SCDI continues to give significant in-kind and part-time operational support to BusinessClub Scotland, a 3000-member organisation whose key aim is to maximise engagement in the 2014 Commonwealth Games and Ryder Cup.

We are also working to support Glasgow's bid for the 2018 Youth Olympic Games, by helping support wider business engagement, recognising the significant economic opportunity this would deliver in terms of major event expertise and supporting the global aspirations of the next generation of young Scots.

FUTURE SCOTLAND Creating a Scotland of prosperity and growth

Over the past 12 months we have undertaken significant policy work and review of the economic issues linked to Scotland's constitutional future. This has been led by the Chair and Board and has resulted in the development of a programme of detailed research and analysis in the areas of Energy, International and Fiscal.

Through our Future Scotland policy work we will seek to work in partnership with a range of academic, research and independent policy organisations to address a range of issues identified by our members. We aim to decouple the politics from the policy and seek to provide independent thought and comment to help inform this critical debate and discussion for the future economy.

Whilst seeking to identify and address critical issues for our membership, during 2011-12 we have also been working on developing a programme of policy activity to help engage and inspire a new generation of young Scots.

Engaging a New Generation

Following on from the 2012 Forum, we have put in place a youth-focused policy engagement programme within the organisation, 4MyGen. The aim of this is to engage a new generation of business leaders within our membership on the policy priorities of the future. It will also seek to determine new channels of communication and engagement that SCDI needs to develop going forward, including digital and social media platforms that will attract and retain future influencers and decision makers.

We anticipate the 4MyGen model developing further over the next 12 months, specifically focused on the issues of youth employability, skills development and Future Scotland.

SCDI's Young Engineers & Science Clubs (YESC) inspire the next generation of engineers and scientists in Scotland, so vital to our economic success.

The YESC programme expanded significantly during the year, engaging more than 10,000 school

pupils across Scotland in exciting, handson science and engineering activities. The network involves 550 primary and secondary schools all over Scotland. YESC is

funded and supported by a growing

number of organisations including Lead Sponsors The Lloyd's Register Educational Trust, Shell U.K. Limited and Tomorrow's Engineers. Principal partners are BP, BT Scotland, National Grid, OPITO and Weir Group.

lives.

The development of new, topical STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) projects linked to the skills agenda in Scotland remains a key strategy of the programme with principal themes including oil and gas, renewables, robotics, electronics, food/drink and manufacturing technology.

During the year the YESC team was commissioned by the Scottish Government to develop a major new resource, Science on the Menu, which introduces young scots to the science of food and drink. This has attracted huge interest from

schools.

Energy is a major theme for YESC and we developed and launched the Hydrocarbons in Action project, supported by OPITO and BP.

More than 60 schools from across Scotland competed in

> the 2012 Junior Saltire Prize Awards, organised in partnership with Skills Development Scotland, which challenged teams to design and test a wave-powered generator.

The Heather's Hut renewable energy project

promotes the investigation of solar, wind and hydro power and more than 200 primaries have now completed this programme, inspired and supported by Dr Heather Reid OBE.

Thanks to the support of the University of Strathclyde, Weir Group and Babcock International, YESC brought cutting edge manufacturing technology to the classroom through the 3D printer project.

Ten secondary clubs across Scotland were mentored by senior undergraduate students to build the 3D printer and then compete in an engineering design challenge set by Weir Group.

In addition to providing grants and resources to clubs, workshops, events and continuing professional development sessions for teachers took place across Scotland.
